## Q: Why should businesses care about labor and employment law?

A: Business owners need to appreciate how much of their day-to-day operations are governed by dozens of state and federal labor laws. The laws affect almost every facet of a business from wages and benefits, to employee safety and health, to personnel issues, including hiring and firing. Failure to comply can lead to serious consequences such as having to pay additional employee wages, civil penalties (including attorneys fees), and in some cases, criminal liability. 
