Rensselaer County Continues to Lower Taxes and Expand Services

We continue to see growth and investment in Rensselaer County, despite uneasiness and reports of a recession on the national level. We are seeing expansion and job growth in our county, and we have been proud to join in and support a string of recent ribbon-cuttings.

Much of the good news, we believe, comes from decisions and strategies employed by the county. Rensselaer County has focused on reducing property taxes each of the past four years, and the tax reductions add up to nearly 20 percent. No other county has reduced property taxes by the same amount during the same time-period. We have sent the message we are serious about growing our county.

We have also expanded services, paving over 170 miles of county roads during the past four years. The County has continued to pave roads and replace bridges this year, and we expect to end 2022 having paved approximately 200 miles of the more than 330 miles in the county road network.

The County is now making final tweaks on the 2023 county budget proposal. While details will be announced in late October, I can offer a brief preview and say that both residents and members of the business community in the County will react favorably to the budget proposal.

One plus to the budget proposal is our continued strong performance with sales tax. Rensselaer County continues to see excellent returns with sales tax, benefitting the county and all municipalities in the county in providing resources to maintain services and keep taxes low. Our most recent report from the state on sales tax showed revenues \$2 million over the previous period. County residents are shopping close to home, and we are attracting more residents from neighboring counties to shop, eat and entertain in our great county.

The County also recently announced the hiring of John Murphy, who for over two decades operated The Snow Man ice cream shop in Lansingburgh. John is bringing his energy, enthusiasm, and contacts to help grow our county and we look forward to working with him.

We do look with considerable concern at the impact of crime on some areas of the county, and negative impacts on businesses. We have had numerous discussions with business owners, including some in downtown Troy, who have stated their worries about crime. As a county, we recognize many of the low-level and mid-level crimes are difficult to prosecute because of bail reform and continue to advocate for repeal of bail reform. A safer county benefits us all, including businesses.

Rensselaer County has enjoyed a strong and productive partnership with the Rensselaer County Regional Chamber of Commerce, and I have enjoyed working with your President Kate Manley. Kate is stepping away from her leadership role and work in growing the county to focus on growing her family. Kate has been a friendly and positive partner in our effort to attract prosperity and new jobs, and we thank her for her role. I will miss seeing Kate at ribbon-cuttings but know she will remain close and an important part of our community. Thank you, Kate, for your work and best wishes from all of us at the county!

40 Years Strolling Downtown Troy Victorian Style

Kind of hard to believe the Victorian Stroll is celebrating 40-years since participants first dressed as if they were living back in the era of Queen Victoria's reign.

The idea for the stroll came about as an offshoot of the Annual Holiday Greens Show at the Hart Cluett Museum in Troy. That show celebrates its 66th year with the theme "The Gilded Age in the Marble House on Second Street". Appropriate as the HBO show "The Gilded Age" is again filming in Troy.



RETURNING TO ITS GLORY

For the past two years COVID-19 sickened not only humans but the Stroll as well. The one-day extravaganza had to be changed, last year the "Stroll Season" spanned three weekends before Christmas with stores and historic locations open (with a mask of course) but minus many of the famed street events and general party atmosphere. According to past Chamber President Kate Manley, it's all coming back this year on Sunday, December 4, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. The gilded age magic will once again feature music, street performers, children's activities, unique boutiques and of course Troy's many restaurants.

SOMETHING NEW

The Arts Center of the Capital Region on River Street will kick off its "TROYGLO" campaign on Stroll Day. It features the installation of 10 festive lighted designs in the restaurant district. Do not plan to drive through looking for these however, you will have to get out and walk to enjoy these displays. According to Elizabeth Reiss, the Center's Chief Executive Officer, the idea is to entice people back into the restaurants and shops and to counter the on-line ordering mentality that came to prominence during the pandemic. According to Ms. Reiss, the Stroll is the perfect event to help people again celebrate the history, culture, and ambiance of downtown Troy in a way that can only be enjoyed in person.

HART CLUETT MUSEUM

Not only is the Museum the inspiration for the Stroll, it also continues to play a major role in Troy's Holiday Season. Once again, the Museum will be using all fresh season greens and gilded-age flowers as members of the Van Rensselear Garden Club decorate all 14 rooms of the 1827 Federal-Style Town House. The greens are placed in such a way as to showcase the architecture and the period rooms of the Gilded Age that belonged to the Hart and Cluett families of Troy. If you are planning to attend the Stroll (as you should), it tops on the must-see list.

ECONOMICS OF THE STROLL

Described by Past President Manley as the preeminent event of Troy's Holiday Season, it's not only enjoyable, but an economic boost to downtown. Shops open their doors to strollers and their wallets. It means for some, a significant amount of extra revenue and chance to show off their wares with the hope some of these new visitors will return at a later date. Says Troy Common Council President Carmella Mantello "the Troy Victorian Stroll is the best in the upstate region and perhaps all of New York State. Our downtown historic streets turn into a bygone Victorian era attracting visitors from near and far. The direct and indirect economic impact to our small businesses, restaurants and shops is invaluable, especially after a challenging couple of years during the pandemic."



FACE TO FACE

"When the Hudson River rises so do the ships of sail." Those are the words of Dave Gardell, the owner of the Ruck in Troy. He speaks of the fact that the Stroll is back to its original format and in particular its people meeting people, strangers getting to know other strangers, perhaps feeding the human desire for companionship. After the restrictions of the pandemic and sheltering in place, he is seeing people craving to get out and mingle, be it in sports, concerts, romantic dinners, or events such as the Stroll. The other positive for him goes back to the economics. Any event such as the Stroll that is not associated with a particular holiday is a boost to his customer base over what he would normally see on a given Sunday. Of course, he and his staff look forward to seeing all the Victorian dress and the entertainment, inside or outside their establishment.
